If you are in this category, you can contact your employer or your local public health district to softedule an appointment or determine options for where vaccines are available for your group.

GROUP 3

It is articipated that individuals 18-84 years of age with medical conditions that increase their risk for severe COVID-19 and essential workers not included in group 2 will be eligible for vaccine.



TENATIVE SCHEDULE. The AARP Foundation hopes to again providing free tax assistance and preparation through its Tax-Aide program. The service is available to low to middle income taxpayers, with a special emphasis on those age 60 and older.

This year appointments are required. Face masks also are required.

Assistance will be offered at the 1912 Center in Moscow on Wednesday's, Thursday's and Friday's from 9:30 to 2:00. This season extends from February 12 thru April 15.

Tax-Aide can prepare most forms including 1040 and supporting schedules, EIC, Child Tax Credit, Other Dependent Credit, Education Credits and Schedule C if no inventory, employees or depreciation.

Taxpayers MUST bring social security cards, photo identification, all income and expense documents, and previous years tax returns are requested.

Are YOU Covid-19 Prey? By Carrie Bitterwolf

Fear and anxiety among about Covid-19 make welcome prey for scammers today, Senior Citizens comprise one of the most vulnerable groups targeted by these schemers because their ages place them among those with high risk for getting this pandemic virus, so it is imperative that you, as a senior citizen, know about this growing concern in order to protect yourself.

What is a <u>SCAM</u>?

Here are several definitions of the word scam.

A dishonest scheme, a fraud.
To cheat or defraud
A fraudulent or deceptive act
or operation

A deceptive scheme or trick used to cheat someone out of something

An illegal plan for making money, Especially if it involves money

An illegal trick, usually with the purpose of getting money from people

To cheat someone out of their possessions

Any fraudulent or business or scheme that takes money or other goods from an unsuspecting person

The intentional use of false or misleading information in an attempt to illegally deprive another person or entity of money, property or legal rights

Different Kinds Scams

Many different kinds of scams exist: phone calls, robocalls, spoofing or phone calls from made up or stolen numbers, and texts; money and investment scams; people impersonating others or pretending they are representing Medicare, Social Security, IRS, the US Post Office or other government agencies; cyber or computer scams, social media and web sites and more. Some scammers have even contacted their intended victims in person. Scammers are highly creative and manipulative.

Updated Covid-19 Scam Facts

With constantly changing and contradicting information coming at you from all directions, how do you know what to believe? Here is the latest information available on coronavirus tests vaccines and cures.

There are **no home test kits** for the coronavirus. No kits have been approved. Beware of kits advertised on the Internet, in magazines, on television, by phone or text. Call your doctor if you think you need a test.

There are no specific treatments to prevent or treat Covid-19 infections.

There are no miracle or holistic cures, and those advertised could be dangerous to your health. Protect yourself by wearing masks, washing hands, social distancing, and not participating in any group activities outside your immediate home. Contact your doctor is you feel you are ill.

Do not pay anyone who says they can get you on a fast tract to get a vaccination.

There are no lists generated that can do that. To get on an appointment list for a vaccination, contact your doctor, local health department, or state information

source (online or by email or phone) for the latest information about getting an appointment if you qualify.

Beware of Contact Tracers who may trying to locate individuals who have positive tests. The cannot give you the name of the individual with the virus. They cannot ask for any of your personal information, identification numbers, or financial information, and they never set up Covid-19 tests for you or receive payment of any kind. Many contact tracers use a script, which scammers have learned to copy. However, scam text will include a link or you may hear a click that gives them access to your phone and personal information.

No one will contact you to find out if you received a **stimulus payment.** If you get a call, text, or email asking you to verify getting a stimulus payment, it is a fraud. If you receive a stimulus payment as a prepaid debit card, it will come in a plain white envelope from Money Network Cardholder Services, and the card will have a Visa symbol on the front and MetaBank on the back. Beware to not throw out these cards.

Hints to Protect Yourself

A rule of thumb for recognizing scams is **if** something sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Don't do it. Another good rule is when in doubt, don't... Several other hints to keep yourself from being scammed include:

If you do not recognize a phone number; do not answer the call; if you do not recognize or know a caller, hang up; give no one any of your personal information.

Do not open email or attachments to an email from any person or business you do not know. Delete them. Create strong pin numbers for your accounts. Purchase a known, strong computer program to protect you and your computer from malware, phishing, and other computer scams.

NO government agency will call you unless you call them first; NO government agency will ask for your Medicare, or social security number; NO government agency will threaten to take away or stop your social security, Medicare or other benefits without prior written notification. ALL Government agencies contact you with written letters sent to your mailing address before taking any action against you.

Ask someone you know or trust about a product or business you do not recognize. Do not let anyone rush you into purchasing or agreeing to do something....just because they want to hurry does not mean that you are in a hurry; take your time.

Do not pay for any purchase with cash, wire transfer, or gift cards. Only make donations to known charities, and make those donations by checks which can be traced. You may also ask that materials be sent to you to look over before you make a donation to give you time to verify the charity.

Social Security Benefits Adjusted

Your Social Security benefit increased by 1.3%. IF the average benefit is \$1500+/-, it would mean a \$20 increase. But, Medicare premiums (\$124 in 2020) also increased slightly. That means the actual increase in your check is likely to be \$14-16. You should have received your Social Statement confirming your benefit amount by now.


